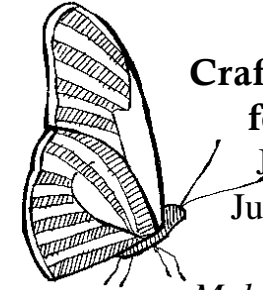
Greetings from Guatemala!

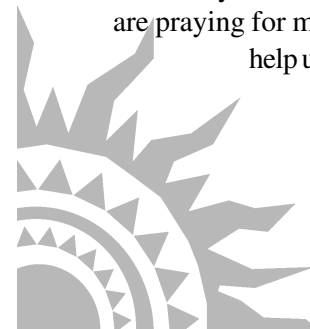
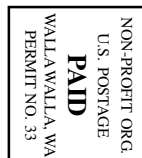
Make every day a holiday

Daddy's Patience

The Lord is so patient. In the Old Testament we witness time and time again God's gracious patience with Israel. As they were led out of Egypt by Moses they shouted for joy and praised God that He had finally answered their prayers after 430 years of bondage, they were finally set free. Slavery and captivity were no more. However, God would use their freedom to shape their hearts and lives as they learned to trust and follow Him.

Do you remember the special food God provided Israel during their time in the desert? If you said Manna you were right. God gave the children of Israel exactly what they needed when they needed it. Each day God would have Manna fall from the heavens and the children of Israel were instructed to gather enough food for their family for that day. On the sixth day they were to gather enough food for two days. If they gathered more than what was needed it would be eaten by maggots before morning. God was teaching the Israelites to trust in Him alone. Deuteronomy 8: 3, 6 says: "And he humbled you and let you be hungry, and fed you with Manna which you did not know, nor did your fathers know, that He might make you understand that man does not live by bread alone, but man lives by everything that proceeds out of the mouth of the Lord. Therefore, you shall keep the commandments of the Lord your God, to walk in his ways and to fear Him."

When I think about God's patience and provision for Israel I am astonished that he would put up with so

much, everything including rebellion, untrustworthiness, a lack of faithfulness, disloyalty to name just a few. Then I am reminded how much He has to put up with me. What an amazing loving Heavenly Father. His patience and care continue for even us (me) today. As we walk this journey of faith, let us be reminded that God will provide for us exactly what we need even as He did for the children of Israel in the Old Testament. 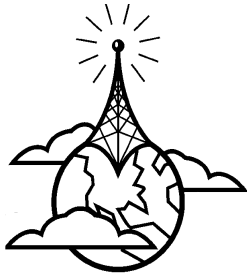

Breakfast at Sally's



I was recently loaned a book. It is recommended reading for Salvation Army board members - Breakfast at Sally's: "One Homeless Man's Inspirational Journey" by Richard LeMieux.

Richard's story is about a man who had a successful publishing business, lived a luxurious life, and traveled widely. When he lost it all he went into a deep depression almost ending his life.

"Sally's" is a nickname for the Salvation Army kitchen in Bremerton, WA. There, Richard meets a variety of homeless people who introduce him to survival on the street.

This book opened up the world of the homeless to me as no other book has. Except for treatment at a state mental institution, all the help he got in Bremerton was from the Salvation Army and churches in the area. No other government agencies were involved. I thought to myself, "This is the way it should be." Jesus didn't say it was Rome's, i.e. the government's, duty to help the poor; it was the business of God's people.

One cautionary note, this is not a book for people who have lived a protected life or who are upset by offensive language or swearing. The author uses the actual language of the homeless when relating their conversations throughout the book. But if you can handle the language I would recommend this book for those who want to know what it is like not to have a place to call home.

God promises to meet all your financial needs, if you

- (1) ask him for help
- (2) learn to be content
- (3) practice giving in faith

There is a universal law called the principle of sowing and reaping. If I sow criticism, I'm going to reap criticism. If I sow generosity, it's going to come back to me, and I'm going to reap generosity.

Every farmer knows this. A farmer has four sacks of seed in his barn and he looks at his empty field. He doesn't complain, "There's no crop! I wish there was a crop!" He just goes out and starts planting seed. When you have a need, plant a seed.

It seems illogical that when I have a need, I should give. That's why it requires faith. God says, "My ways are not your ways."

Why did God set it up that way? Because God is a giver. He is the most generous giver in the universe, and God wants you to learn to be like him. He wants to build character in you.

The Bible says, "Honor the Lord with your wealth and with the best part of everything you produce" (Proverbs 3:9 NLT). This is the principle of tithing. It's the principle that says every time I make one hundred dollars, the first ten dollars goes back to God.

Tithing is an act of worship. We're giving to God. We're saying, "All of it came from you anyway." God says, "Put me first in your life and watch what I do." You may think you can't afford to tithe, but the reality is, you can't afford not to.

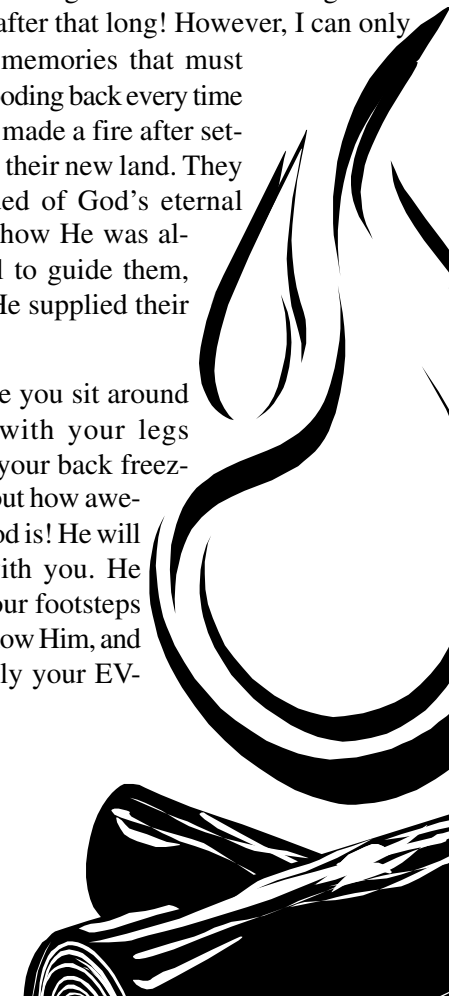
